	Individual Players Reports				
Board 1	I played with white pieces and came out on top in a Nimzo Indian defence in the opening and early middle game only to relinquish all my advantages in the endgame as usual. I definitely need improvement on my endgame.				
Lara	Good game though.				
Board 2	My game, black again, was my Sicilian dragon against a closed fianchetto attack.				
Laurie	My opponent I suspected a good positional player, so I played quite aggressively on the queenside with pawn pushes and rook on the knight file.				
	I halted his kingside ambitions but with my opponent forcing knight exchanges it became a different game with				
	bishops and rooks. Although I had a space advantage the game was very drawish and I didn't feel my opponent would make a silly mistake. A draw was agreed.				
Board 3	I was white, and the game turned into a dynamic English. My opponent put his pawns on e5 and f5, which				
Tim	hinted at attacking intentions. So I attacked in the middle - with pawns; and he attacked on both flanks,				
	simultaneously with gangs of pieces, any many tactical pitfalls to negotiate. My opponent's foxy strategy				
	succumbed to the hedgehog plan of my queen's pawn, which rolled irresistibly straight through the chaos to expose the vacant h1-a8 diagonal for my own personal use and which, in the wake of the vacant d-file created b				
	my queen pawn, proved too much. My opponent had to endure heavy loss of material, or get mated. Very				
	satisfying because there were no blunders or gross mistakes for once.				
Board 4	I had a bit of a strange game, had a bit of a moment on move 1 and played 1f5 against 1.Nc3 which seems like				
Andrew	total nonsense after 2.e4.				
	However, it did get us both out of theory after move 1! This led to me spending a huge amount of time in the opening to avoid getting punished and had time trouble for the rest of the game.				
	The game got very sharp and I ended up getting a decent position and into an ending 2 pawns up, which I				
	unfortunately couldn't convert so ended up with a draw (with 10 seconds left on my clock)!				
Board5	1.e4 e5 2.c4 Nf6				
Adam	At this point I really considered the Urusov Gambit, because I really like it if the opponent is unsure about it. I had done it against Royston the season before and won the game in 7 moves – Nigel would have been proud				
	(although I still took my time in playing it). Trouble was, I had never played my opponent before, didn't know his				
	grade and wasn't playing for my team. Not wanting to let Andrew down in his first match I opted for the safe				
	option.				
	This was pretty much how the game went throughout. I had some play in the middle which forced his king side				
	open, but he had play in the centre of the board. I did sacrifice a pawn at the end which allowed me a neat pin				
	and the pawn regained but wasn't able to make my late push stick or gain any real advantage. A draw was				
	offered and accepted. A fair result, I felt.
